October 25th, 1881 - April 8th, 1973 He was born in Malaga, Spain.


His full name, which honors a variety of relatives and saints, is: **Pablo Diego José Francisco de Paula Juan Nepomuceno María de los Remedios Cipriano de la Santísima Trinidad Martyr Patricio Clito Ruíz y Picasso.**

He was a painter, sculptor, printmaker, ceramicist, and stage designer.

Along with his friend Georges Braque, he is credited with the creation of **cubism**.




According to legend, his first words were "piz, piz," his attempt at saying "lápiz," the Spanish word for pencil.




His father began teaching him to draw and paint when he was a child.

When he was 14 years old, he was admitted to Barcelona's School of Fine Arts, despite being several years younger than the school's usual age limit.


He painted this painting, "Man in a Beret," at age 14.



Picasso loved to paint the people and events in his everyday life.



He created art in many different styles.




"Whenever I wanted to say something, I said it the way I believed it should [be said]," he explained. "Different themes inevitably require different methods of expression. This does not imply either evolution or progress; it is a matter of following the idea one wants to express and the way in which one wants to express it."



When painting portraits, he often chose to break up the human form and show the face from multiple angles. These portraits are examples of cubism.

What are the elements of Cubism?


- Multiple perspectives






You will need:

Steps One and Two




Start with one big piece and several small pieces of orange paper, plus one small piece of green paper.



Draw facial features on the small pieces of orange paper. Some should face forward and some should face sideways.


Steps Three and Four




Decide where each facial feature will go. Move them around as much as you want. Be creative!

Glue your facial features to your orange square.


Steps Five and Six
